YEAR 3 EXPECTATIONS

In Year 3 the children are becoming more independent as they have now entered Key Stage 2. This means that they are more responsible for their belongings. Please make sure that all uniform (including coats) is labelled so things don't get lost! It is up to the children to keep their things safe.

It is important that the children come to school ready to learn. This includes their attendance, being on time, having the correct uniform, and entering the classroom with a positive attitude to learning.

































































PE DAYS

- PE sessions will take place on **Thursdays** and **Fridays**. Please send your child to school in their PE kit on these days. As the days get colder, please ensure they have suitable clothing, such as black tracksuit bottoms, for when they are outside.
- During the autumn term we will be going swimming every Thursday morning. Start date TBC. We will be travelling by coach with Year 5. Children will need a swimming bag with trunks/costume, towel, swimming hat and goggles if required. Please ensure children have this kit in school every Thursday. The children's current ability will be assessed in the first lesson by qualified instructors. They will then be put into groups for their lessons.
- If your child would like to have a spare pair of black trainers or plimsolls in school for those muddy, rainy days then these can be kept in the Year 3 cloakroom. This is **not** compulsory.
- Long hair needs to be tied up and no jewelry or nail varnish please. For those children with their ears pierced, earrings should be taped or removed on PE days.

READING AND SPELLINGS

Please continue to read with your child as often as possible, share books with your child and (optionally) practice reading and writing Year 3 Common Exception words.

Children will read during guided reading sessions in the mornings. They will have their home reading books and reading records sent home on a Tuesday. Please then return these books with the reading records to be changed the following Tuesday.

Spellings will be a mix of Year 3 common exception words and words containing the spelling of the week from Oxford Owl's Essential Spellings and Word Knowledge scheme which will be taught 3 times a week. The spellings will be sent home on Thursday with a spelling test every Thursday morning. These will be differentiated and your child may be given Year 2 common exception words if they are more appropriate.

MORE ON READING

Please, please, read with your child every day!

Reading books will be sent home every *Tuesday* and are expected to come back to school the following *Tuesday*.

The reading journal is used to write what your child has been reading. Reading journals should be sent in alongside your child's reading books.

If your child is a free reader, they can just bring in their reading journal on Tuesday to be checked and will only need to return their reading book when they are ready to exchange it for a new one.

BEHAVIOUR

- We will continue to have Star and Value certificates which will go home on Fridays.
- This year we also have Our Valued Behaviour postcards, which can be awarded by any
 member of staff to children showing valued behaviours in school (for example: showing
 respect and being honest.
- Children will be awarded merits for giving their best, showing kindness and fairness in class and other positive behaviours which will (hopefully!) accumulate and result in being awarded a certificate from Mr Varney.

E-SAFETY

ASSESSMENT

- We no longer have 'Levels'.
- Children are now assessed according to whether they have met age-related expectations (ARE).
- There are a set of objectives in each subject: children need to meet most of these to have reached ARE.
- We are now reporting on whether or not they are where they should be according to their age (as prescribed by the government).

ASSESSMENT TERMS WE USE

- Working below the expected range for their age.
- Working broadly within the expected range for their age.

Children are developing skills within their year group expectations, although they may not yet be secure — almost there!

Working securely within the expected range for their age.

Children have securely met the majority of learning objectives prescribed for their year group — ideally this is where they should be.

Working above the expected range for their age.

Children are working beyond what has been prescribed for their year group.
